## FROM REVD VICKY BURTON

I hope that some of you already know this about me — that I'm very interested in listening to people and finding out about them. As my Grandma used to say, "People matter." Life is often about people, but I'm sorry, guys, because I want to be more interested in listening to the Lord than listening to you. I want to desire to know Him more — knowing who He is, what He's like, what He is thinking, saying, and communicating. And I think I need that more than I need to know other stuff.

So how about becoming more contemplative? When I think of biblical contemplation, I'm reminded that it's not about navel-gazing, nor is it about emptying my mind, or even about becoming more self-aware, though that may be a side effect. Nor is it about thinking more, or philosophising about things. Nor is it something I want to do because I'm middle-aged! Rather, Christ-like contemplation is, surely: "Be still and know that I am God" (Psalm 46:10). "Renew a right spirit within me" (Psalm 51:10). Wow! God, you are totally awesome! (Me!). It is surrendering myself unto Him. Absorbing Scripture; being in His presence; sitting at His feet like Martha and Lazarus's sister Mary; listening deeply; being attentive to the Lord.

Saint Augustine of Hippo, whose writings and theology have influenced the Church since the fifth century, wrote in his Confessions, "You move us to delight in praising You; for You have made us for Yourself, and our hearts are restless until they find their rest in You."

But it's a struggle to be still. To rest in His presence. I find myself making excuses, thinking, It's just the way I am. There are so many distractions! Recently, I have been praying from Psalm 27: "Teach me your ways, Lord." And the same psalmist says, "Wait on the Lord; be strong, take heart and wait..." Having just rushed through Advent, I know I'm not good at waiting on the Lord.

Yet Augustine's phrase, "Our hearts are restless until they find their rest in You," rings true in my own experience. Have you ever been in the presence of God so as not to think about anything else at all, and indeed not to want to move on to any task or distraction? It is true rest (Hebrews 4:11). Oh, how Jesus must have longed to linger there with His Father, especially when so many things and people were yelling for His attention. In fact, Jesus must have spent hours and hours learning Scripture and being in His Father's presence before He even began His "ministry" at the age of 30.

Practising and forming good habits is perhaps out of fashion, but I remember when I was learning to play the cello. Some people put it all down to some sort of natural ability, but I wonder whether it was more about my deepest desire, because I spent hours and hours — firstly sitting at the piano and then later on with my cello — playing daily, alone and with others. Years of practice. I loved it because I desired it. Perhaps I need to ask God to give me more of a hunger and desire to be in His presence.

Think of the sunflower, whose nature it is to turn its head toward the light as it grows. Our Creator may have put that same habit into our hearts when He knit us together in the secret place — to habitually turn towards Him, the source of light and life. And yet I find myself again and again in the habit (well-practised, I'd say!) of turning away from His bright face towards other things. So pray with me, that our desire to spend time with Him will grow, that we may practise well these good habits, and so may we reflect His image more and more.

## **BALDONS PARISH COUNCIL NEWS**

### **Baldons village website**

As you may have seen posted on Baldons info, the village website host platform appears to have gone out of business. One of our residents has found a way to recover most of the content stored on the original site and work is to commence on building a new site as soon as possible. Until the new site is available, we will post meeting minutes and agendas via Baldons info and any other important updates also.

### **Mobile coverage in the Baldons**

We met with Oxfordshire County Councils digital infrastructure programme director recently to discuss the patchy and poor mobile coverage most of us experience. This is particularly concerning in the light of the digital land line switch over which would leave most residents reliant on mobile phones for communications during a power cut.

Rather than waiting for commercial operators to address this gap, the Parish Council will work with the team at OCC to investigate potential solutions via a new scheme called **Digital Places programme**, a collaborative initiative that works with local authorities and other public sector organisations to deliver improved connectivity to underserved communities. We hope to be able to update on progress in identifying solutions in April, but actual delivery of a solution may take much longer. We will continue to update as we progress.

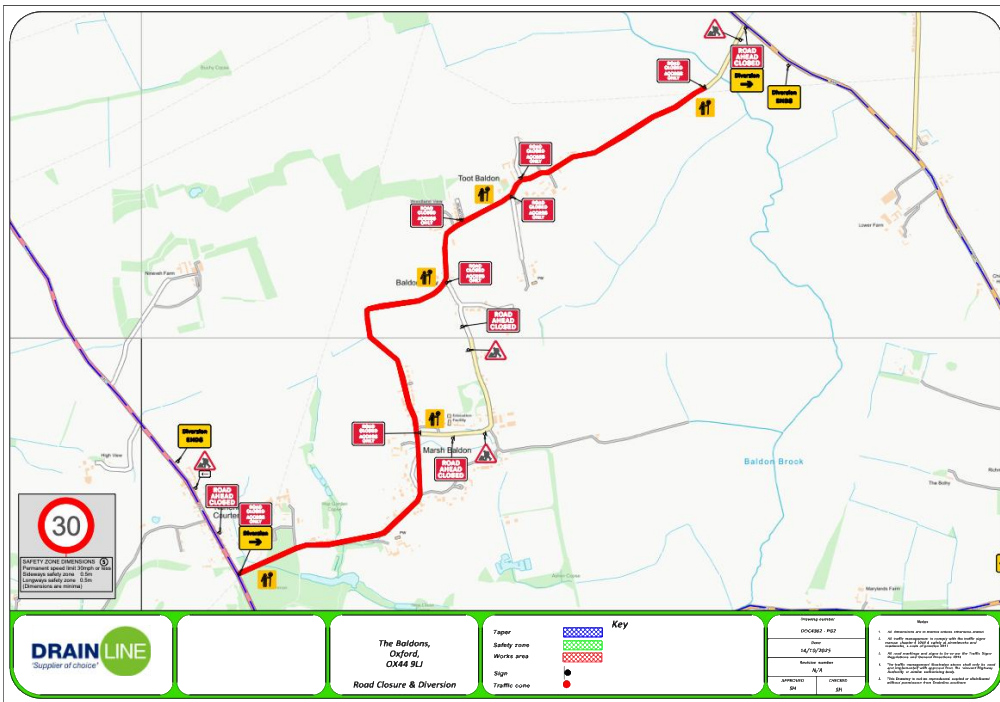
### **Contamination in the ditch across the Green**

Before the new year, we discovered some suspicious looking brown sludge in the ditch. Thames Water investigated immediately, tested the water and confirmed it was not sewage. The Environment Agency was called and subsequently inspected and believe the sludge is an iron oxidizing bacterium from the ground. Tests are being undertaken to confirm this, and we will advise of the results in due course.

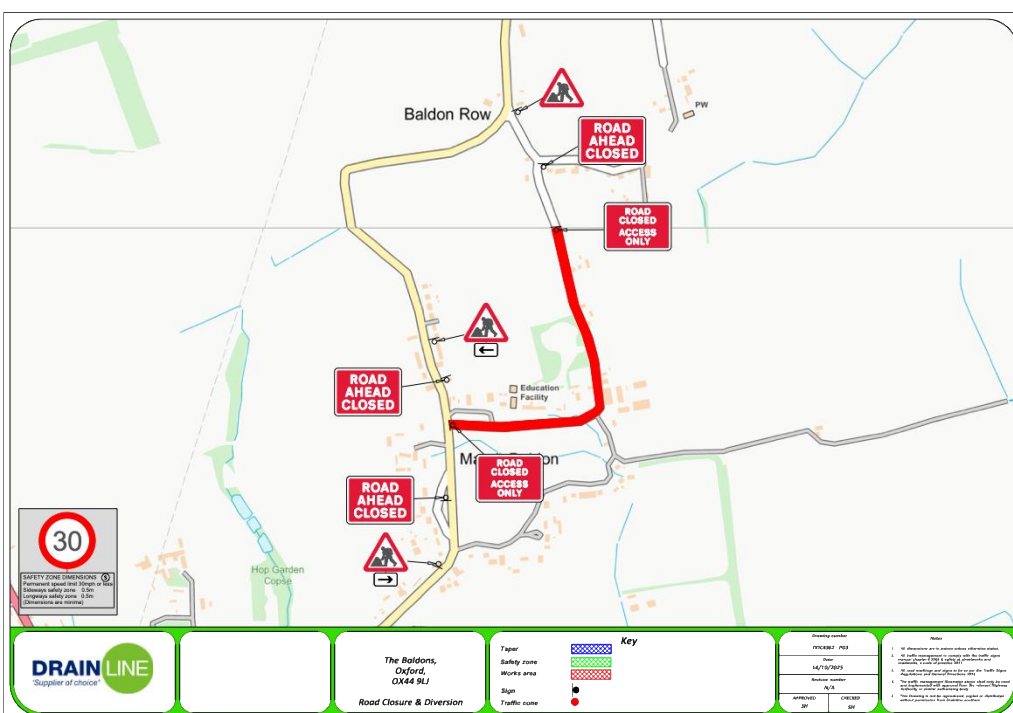
## Road closures in the Baldons February

There are 2 planned closures, by Oxfordshire County Council, both are to facilitate drainage CCTV and investigation works that will hopefully improve the drainage in those areas. For both closures, workings hours are between 9.30am to 3.30pm and appropriate traffic signs will be displayed to indicate when the measures are in force. Exemptions are included for police, fire and ambulance services and for the works and for access to premises which are only accessible from the closed section of road. The alternative route for traffic will be signed locally.



## **Council Tax increase**

The parish council has approved a 9.3% increase in the addition to your Council Tax that pays for its work. You'll see this on your Council Tax bills when they arrive in March. The 5% increase last year was the first increase for three years in what you have been asked to pay.

A 9.3% increase is equivalent to an increase of 11p per week in your Council Tax if your home is in Band D – less if your home is in a lower band, more if it's in a higher one. Setting a budget for the next financial year and agreeing how much the Council needs from residents' Council Tax are major decisions the Council has to take each January.

The main reason for the increase for 2025-26 was to cover the cost of cutting the grass regularly so the Playing Field could once again be used for the purposes for which the Harcourts gave it to the village after the Second World War.

Similarly, the main reason for the increase for next year is that once the Association starts putting children's play equipment and adult fitness equipment on the Playing Field, as it plans to do, the Council needs to pay for accident insurance and for an expensive annual inspection of the play equipment by a qualified professional – weekly and monthly inspections can be carried out by volunteers.

Many parishioners have been frustrated that the Playing Field has been virtually unusable in recent years, but play areas aren't cheap to create or maintain: they're not money-spinners - quite the opposite.

## **Next parish council meeting**

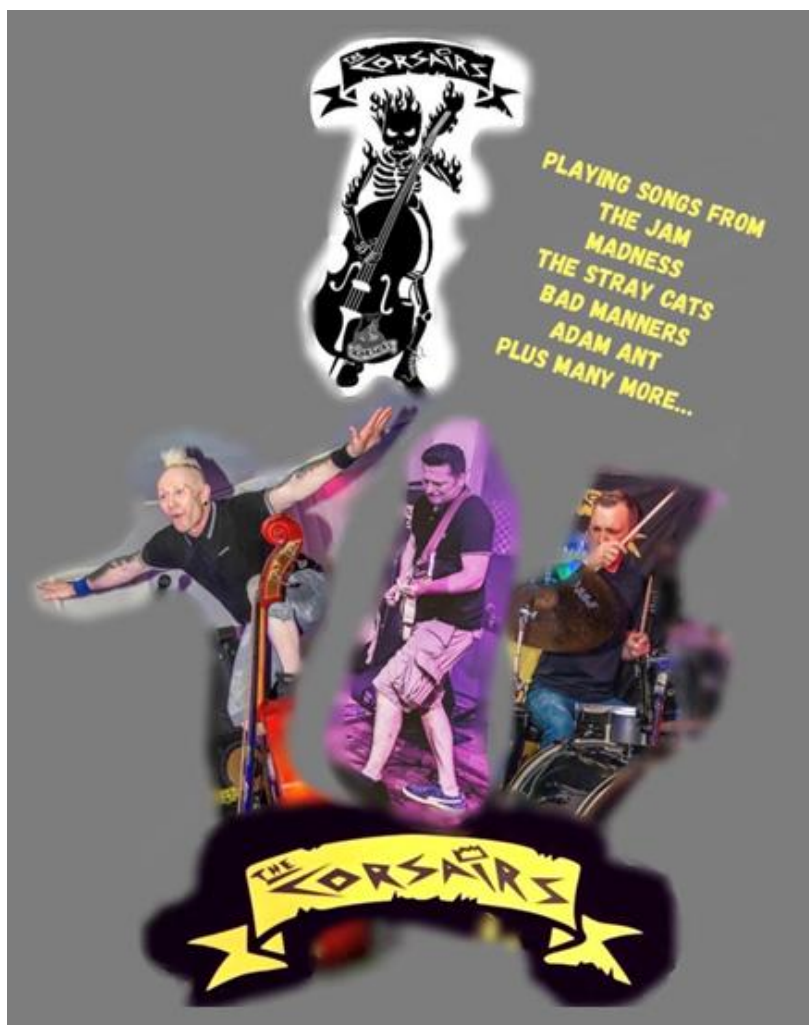
The parish council meets again on Tuesday 3rd March at the usual time of 7.30pm in the usual place, your Village Hall.

There weren't any requests for money from the Playing Field Association or the Village Hall Committee at the Council's January meeting, so the Council still has £8,135 left of Community Infrastructure Levy money it can use for things like capital expenditure – such as improvements to the Playing Field or the Village Hall. It will be no surprise if the Council receives proposals for use of some of that money at its March meeting.

Remember, you can always come along and watch Council meetings. You can even address the Council if you let the Chair know before she opens the meeting.

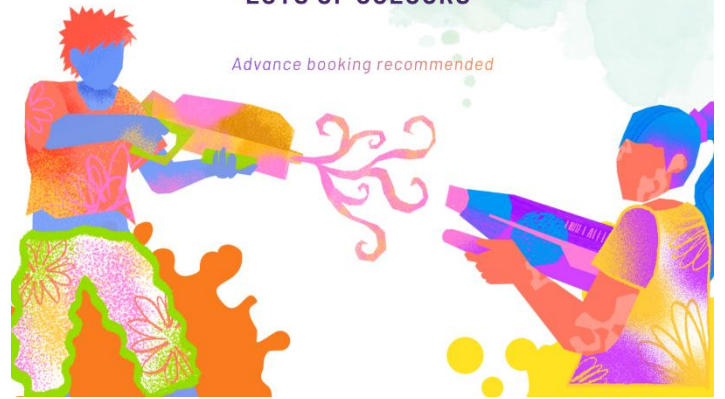

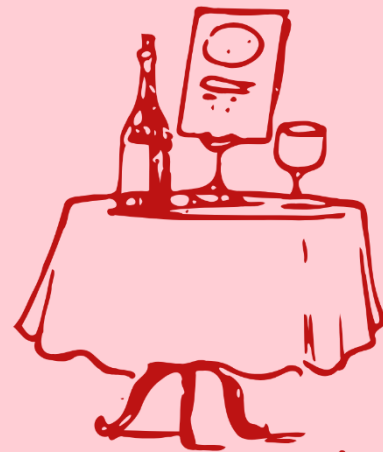

## Making best use of technology to help cut crime and catch criminals

Just before Christmas Thames Valley Police rolled out a live facial recognition operation in Oxford, aimed as much at explaining the technology to the public as well as catching criminals.

The use of live facial-recognition technology can bring great benefits to help cut crime and catch criminals.



Whilst the use of this technology is widely welcomed by most people, there are understandable concerns by some. I have worked closely with the police to ensure that all the necessary safeguards are put in place to protect privacy and the only people who should have anything to fear from the use of live facial-recognition are criminals seeking to target people and property in our community.

The system does not - and cannot - identify everyone that it sees, but instead is looking for those on a specific watchlist. Those who are either wanted by the police or have a warrant issued for them by the courts. Essentially it is very much like the screenlock that many of us will use on our mobile phones. It recognises the people the police are looking for, but simply doesn't recognise the rest of us.

It is important that the police explain the use of this tactic and ensure widespread consent from the public. The use of any technology just provides a tool to the police. It is still the men and women of Thames Valley Police who will use their professional judgment and put themselves in harm's way to protect the public.

The effectiveness of these operations will continually be evaluated, alongside other tactics the police use. With more officers in neighbourhood policing roles and overall crime falling, it remains important that the police are able to address the issues that matter most to the public. You can play your part by reporting any crimes or suspicious activity you see in your community on [thamesvalley.police.uk](https://www.thamesvalley.police.uk) or by calling 101.

On the first operation in Oxford eight arrests were made, several for domestic abuse offences. Dangerous people being taken off the streets to prevent crime.

## MESSAGE FROM OLLY GLOVER MP

This past month has been particularly busy, both in Parliament and meeting with local businesses in the constituency.

As discussions about the government's Great British Railways Bill continue, I have used my role as Liberal Democrat Transport Spokesperson to ensure the passengers are at the centre of these discussions. It is essential they improve the ongoing issues, such as train delays and expensive tickets, which I and many in our constituency experience regularly.

I have been spending time with some of our wonderful small businesses to better understand the impact of last year's budget and the support they need to keep trading and providing us with products and food. It is always a highlight of my week visiting local businesses and community groups to learn about the work they do for our communities and making sure I am well informed when raising their needs in when in parliament. I have also had the pleasure of meeting many residents in Stanford in the Vale and Didcot on their doorsteps recently and in Wantage at one of my regular surgeries. My team and I have now closed over 10,000 constituent cases, supporting individuals, families and businesses to resolve a huge variety of problems.
